FOREWORD

Union Christian College (Autonomous), Aluva, with a proud legacy spanning over 104 years, stands as a distinguished institution of higher learning in India. 1921 by four young visionaries and educationalists who were old students and teachers of Madras Christian College, Prof K C Chacko, Prof C P Mathew, Prof A M Varkey and Prof V M Itteyera, with a vision of holistic development of the students. The institution began its academic journey with a junior intermediate course, enrolling 64 students and employing 6 teachers in a rented building. Later, it was shifted to Kacheri Malika, donated by the Maharaja of Travancore. From its inception, the College has consistently upheld a commitment to academic excellence, holistic development, and a deep-rooted social consciousness.

Our journey through the decades has been marked by continuous growth and academic distinction. The college was recognised by the R. Sankar Award instituted by the Government of Kerala for the best Special Grade Arts and Science College in the State for the Year 2000-2001. The institution was the first in Kerala to receive a five-star rating from NAAC in 1999, and in 2024, the college was accredited with an A++ grade in the 5th Cycle of NAAC accreditation. The commendable positions in national rankings NIRF 97th rank in 2022 and 77th rank in 2023, and 12th ranking in KIRF 2024, bear testimony to our unwavering dedication to quality education and institutional integrity.

Union Christian College offers a wide spectrum of programmes across both aided and self-financing streams, designed to meet the evolving educational needs of our diverse student body. The college now has 18 UG, 14 PG programs and 10 research centers, and 1 interdisciplinary research centre. Our strength lies in our experienced and highly qualified faculty, who foster an academic environment that promotes research, critical thinking, and intellectual curiosity. The College places a strong emphasis on academic integrity, transparency, and accountability, ensuring a system that is both inclusive and progressive.

It includes dedicated facilities for visually impaired students and maintains an archive of rare books, some of which date back to the early 19th century.

This prospectus is subject to modification/addition/deletion as may be deemed necessary by the College. The whole process of admission to the UG Programmes will be done by Union Christian College (Autonomous), Aluva, independently of the CAP of Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam

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1. ONLINE APPLICATION & ADMISSION

A. Application Submission Guidelines

Candidates seeking admission to the **Undergraduate Programmes** at *Union Christian College, Aluva (Autonomous)* for the academic year **2025–26** are required to submit their applications **exclusively through the online portal**. The online application must be completed **on or before the last date specified** in the **official admission schedule**, which is published on the College website.

Applicants may access the registration portal by visiting: www.ucccollege.edu.in

Please note that **only applications submitted online within the stipulated timeframe** will be considered for the admission process.

1. Applicants are advised to complete the online application using a laptop or desktop computer to ensure optimal functionality and a seamless registration experience.
2. Each candidate may select up to six programme options while applying. Selection of a minimum of three programmes is mandatory.
3. The application fee is ₹250/- for General category candidates and ₹100/- for SC/ST candidates. The application fee for management quota is ₹500/-. This fee covers up to six programme choices, including Self-financing programmes. Please note that the application fee is non-refundable, under all circumstances.
4. Candidates applying under the Sports, Cultural, or Community quota must submit their applications through the online portal. For Community Quota applicants, a valid Community Certificate issued by the Village Officer/Parish Priest must be produced at the time of verification.
5. Candidates applying under the Sports or Cultural quota are required to submit a hard copy of the completed application form either in person or by post along with self-attested copies of relevant certificates to the College Office.
6. Candidates seeking admission under the Management Quota must apply online via the College Admission Portal along with supporting documents and Recommendation Letters.
7. Candidates, other than those applying under sports/cultural quotas are not required to send or submit a printed copy of the application form to the College Office.
8. All admission-related notifications and updates will be communicated through SMS and email to the registered mobile number and email address provided during the application process.

B. Requirements for Online Registration:

1. Review Official Documents before proceeding with the application, ensure you have thoroughly read the 'Instructions' and 'Prospectus' available on the college website.

2. Applicants must possess a valid email address and mobile number. If you do not have an email ID, create one and confirm its functionality before using it for registration.
3. Upload a recent passport-size photograph (taken within the last six months). File size: Must be between 60 KB and 100 KB. Upload a scanned image of your signature. File size: Must be between 60 KB and 100 KB
4. Upload clear scanned copies of the following:
5. Final mark sheets of your 10th and Plus Two (or equivalent) examinations
6. Certificates for claiming reservation benefits or bonus marks (such as those for NCC, NSS, Sports, Arts, etc.)
7. If applying under the NCC quota, compile and upload a single document that includes:
 - ❖ Participation certificate(s)
 - ❖ NCC 'B' Certificate
8. Candidates applying under both Cultural and Sports quotas must compile all relevant certificates into a single file and upload it accordingly.

C. Online Registration Process:

1. New applicants must begin by clicking on the '**Apply Now**' button on the admission portal.
2. After completing the initial registration details, your **username and password** will be sent to your **registered email ID** or via **SMS**. These credentials are essential for logging in to your account. Use the provided **username and password** to log in to your application portal.
3. Complete the application form carefully. Ensure you upload the following documents where applicable:
 - ❖ Scanned **passport-size photograph with name and date**
 - ❖ Scanned **signature**
 - ❖ Scanned copies of all necessary **certificates** (e.g., academic, reservation, quota-related)
4. If applying under the **community quota**, select '**Community Quota**' in the relevant section of sign up page.
5. Pay the **application fee online** using any of the following methods:
 - ❖ Debit/Credit Card
 - ❖ Net Banking
 - ❖ **UPI**
6. Double-check all entered information carefully.
7. Most sections can be edited during subsequent logins **including the marks entry page**.

8. **No changes will be allowed after clicking the 'Submit' button.**
9. Always **log out** from the admission portal before leaving the computer to ensure your data remains secure.
10. **Any attempt to create a false or unauthorized registration by an individual or institution will attract punitive action as per applicable rules and regulations.**

D. Admission Process

1. Rank lists for each programme will be prepared in accordance with the rules outlined in the **college prospectus**.
2. Candidates are advised to regularly check the **provisional rank lists** published on the **college website** and **notice board**. Any discrepancies must be reported before the **correction deadline** mentioned in the prospectus.
3. Final rank lists will be published on the **college website** and notice board on the specified date. Admissions will proceed based on the final rank list after incorporating all necessary corrections.
4. Candidates must regularly visit the college website for updates regarding **admission schedules** and related changes.
5. **Admission memos will not be sent by post.** Notifications will be sent via **email** and/or **SMS**. Please note: If your mobile number has **DND (Do Not Disturb)** enabled, you may not receive SMS alerts from the college.
6. Eligible candidates will be invited for **original certificate verification** in the order of their appearance on the rank list.
7. The college will **verify all original documents** at the time of admission.
8. Candidates called for certificate verification must report to the college on the scheduled date. Be prepared to pay the **prescribed fee**, including **caution deposits**, if admitted. Failure to report or remit the required fee will result in the candidate being marked as **'Not Joined'**, and no further claims for admission will be entertained.
9. Candidates claiming **reservations or bonus marks** must present the **original supporting documents** during verification.
10. Always mention your **application number** in any communication with the college office.

Eligibility for Admission

Candidates can be admitted only if their qualifying examinations have been recognized by Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam for admissions to UG programmes under the University. No candidate shall be admitted to the degree programme unless he/she possesses the qualifications and minimum requirements thereof.

If an applicant for admission is found to have indulged in ragging in the past or if it is noticed later that he/she had indulged in ragging, admissions shall be denied or he/she shall be expelled from the college.

3. RESERVATION OF SEATS

Seats available for Government-aided programmes and Self-Financing programmes in the college are available under the categories of **Merit seats, Community seats, Management seats and seats under Mandatory reservation (SC/ST) seats.**

A. Types of Reservation: Seats will be reserved for candidates under the following reservation categories.

- (i) Reservation for International Students
- (ii) Reservation for Nominees.
- (iii) Reservation for Persons with Disabilities.
- (iv) Special Reservation.
- (v) Mandatory Reservation.

(i) Reservation for International Students

10% additional seats shall be created over and above the sanctioned strength and added to the total merit seats exclusively for the purpose of accommodating international students. These seats shall not be filled up with other candidates. The students who seek admission in this category should first apply online and submit the print out of the online application to the college.

(ii) Reservation for Nominees:

An additional seat for each programme shall be created exclusively for the purpose of accommodating students sponsored by the **Union Territory of Lakshadweep**. This seat shall not be filled up by other candidates. **Reservation of Seats for Malayalee students from Andaman & Nicobar Islands:-** : An additional seat for each programme shall be created exclusively for the purpose of Malayalee students from Andaman & Nicobar Islands. This seat shall not be filled up by other candidates (U.O.No.6199/AI/2016/Acad dated 823.11.2016). The students who seek admission in this category should first apply online and submit the print out of the online application to the colleges concerned. Two additional seats for each programme shall be created exclusively for the purpose of accommodating students under **transgender** category as per U.O.No.2532/ACA1/2019/MGU dated 10.06.2019.

(iii) Reservation for Persons with Disabilities (PD):

'Person with disability' means a person suffering from not less than 40% of any disability as certified by a Medical Board constituted for this purpose. Candidates who have a minimum of 40% disability will be eligible for this quota. A relaxation of 5% of marks in the qualifying examination from the prescribed minimum is allowed.

Candidates seeking admission under PD category should provide with their application form, an attested copy of the 'Certificate of disability' issued by a District Medical Board or bodies of higher status, certifying the degree or percentage of disability at the time of admission. The unfilled seats under the PD category shall be converted to grant reservation for Children with Special Need (CWSN). The eligibility prescribed for the Physically Challenged Candidates will be applicable to the Children with special need as well.

5% over and above sanctioned seats are reserved for candidates with disabilities for all programmes. 1% of seats shall be reserved for each of the three sections of **Persons with Disabilities category (Blind, Deaf and Orthopedically Challenged)** with no provision for interchangeability of seats, if candidates are not available in a particular category in a year. The rank list under this category will be based on merit and physical suitability, and not on the basis of the degree of disability. Three additional seats for UG programmes will be created over and above the sanctioned strength for accommodating students suffering from autism/intellectual disability/specific learning disability/mental illness as per GO No. 229/2023/HEDN dated 02.05.2023

No reservation of seats is allowed for Blind candidates for science subjects. Selected candidates under PD quota should report directly to the College before the last date for their admission as per given at the beginning of this prospectus.

Reservation of one seat per college for students from Government Children's Homes or Institutions coming under Juvenile Justice Act (U. O. No. 5003/AC A 1/2021/MGU dated 25.09.2021)

Reservation for Orphan Candidates As per government norms, 2 seats per program (1 Male and 1 Female) per program shall be created over and above the sanctioned strength for orphan candidates. (U. O. No 3149/AC A 1/2024/MGU dated 08.04.2024)

(iv) Special Reservation:

The seats reserved under **Sports Quota** and **Cultural Quota** come under this category. Selected candidates under these quotas should report to the College before the last date for their admission as per admission schedule given at the beginning of this prospectus.

Sports quota: -

Age Limit: Upper age limit for applying through Sports quota is 25 years.

The following norms are prescribed for admission under sports quota.

Sports quota: - Two seats in each programme (Interchangeable) shall be reserved for candidates with outstanding records in Sports & Games. However, not more than 20% of seats reserved for the general quota seats of a particular programme shall be filled for sports quota when applying interchangeability for a particular programme. The applicant for admission to the sports reservation quota should have won a minimum of Third position (Bronze Medal) in the school subdistrict competition (inter - School at Plus Two/Higher Secondary Level) in addition to his /her satisfying the academic eligibility.

The following guidelines shall be followed in determining merit in sports for admission to the U.G. Programmes. Marks shall be awarded for the Sports merit certificates as detailed in the appended Table.

A. The minimum eligibility for admission of a candidate to Under Graduate Programme (sports quota) will be winning a minimum of third position in the school subdistrict competition (inter School at Plus Two/Higher Secondary level) in addition to his/her satisfying the academic eligibility.

B. Performance in any year during the Plus Two Programme will be taken into consideration.

Addendum

1. Achievements in those sports disciplines/events in MG University Sports calendar shall only be considered for UG Sports quota admissions.
2. An approved world competition means the competitions organized by the International Apex Bodies of the concerned discipline and in which the national Teams are sponsored by the National Apex Bodies and cleared by Sports Authority of India/ Government of India.

3. The National Championship means the championships conducted by the National Apex Bodies of the concerned discipline. District Competition means revenue district competition conducted by district associations in respective sports.

4. Individual games /event means a game/event in which individual performs alone.

5. When a candidate has number of achievement in a sports /different discipline his/ her best achievement will be taken in to consideration.

6. All competitions where an upper age limit is fixed (Youth/Junior/Sub-Junior) would be treated as Junior event provided it is not classified as senior event by the concerned National Federation.

7. Priority will be given for students having achievements in senior level competitions than junior and youth category competitions.

8. Resolving of Tie:

- If the points of more candidates happen to be the same, then for breaking the 'tie', the following criteria shall be followed one after another in the order given below:
- A person can score points only in one category.
- The highest score will be counted
- Where bracketed, scores in other categories will be counted
- Where still bracketed, Priority will be given in the order of merit i.e.; 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place respectively.
- Those with a greater number of achievements in the same level will be placed above the others (a greater number of 1st places, a greater number of 2nd places and so on).
- Individual achievements will be ranked above team achievements.
- A new record is created; he/she will be given priority.

If the tie could not be resolved by any of the above-mentioned sports achievements, the index marks based on the qualifying examination shall be considered for breaking the tie.

1. Performance in any year during the Plus One/Plus Two level will be taken into consideration.
2. The students admitted in Sports quota shall mandatorily be available to represent the College in the Inter University competitions unless specifically exempted by the Principal, Mar Athanasius College.
3. For team events, colleges should upload the events they wish to choose in the beginning of each academic year

NOTE: Those who seek admission through sports quota, shall apply online and upload necessary documents at the time of applying online.

Applicants shall be able to choose programmes in various departments based on the events chosen by the college/ team preferences of the college shall prepare and publish the provisional rank list.

The applicants included in the provisional rank list shall report to college on the dates specified for the physical verification of records/credentials claimed in the online application.

A final rank list shall be prepared after the physical verification of records by the college authorities and candidates may obtain admission as per the rank list on the dates stipulated by the College.

If vacancies arise due to discontinuation of candidates under Sports quota, the next eligible candidate in the Rank List shall be admitted.

No candidates under any circumstances shall be allowed to apply after the last date specified for the sports quota admissions as the seats are deducted from general merit quota seats.

Cultural Quota: - One seat for each degree programme (interchangeable) shall be reserved for students who excel in Youth festival recognised by Director of Public Instruction (DPI). The selection shall be made from among the applicants for the cultural quota on merit as detailed in Table below:

4. OTHER GENERAL RULES FOR MANDATORY RESERVATION

Claims for Mandatory Reservations must be made by a candidate at the time of submission of online application. Candidates must provide original certificates supporting their claim at the time of admission. The claims for **mandatory** reservation once made cannot be altered under any circumstances.

Claims for Reservation under Kerala Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes Quota:-Candidates claiming reservation under Kerala Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes Quota should obtain caste/community certificate from the Village Offices concerned.

Other General Rules for Mandatory Reservation:-The seats un-availed by the SC candidates will go to ST candidates and vice versa. The un-availed seats reserved for SC/ST shall be re-notified twice through print media and a special allotment shall be conducted exclusively for filling up vacant seats of SC/ST candidates. If such seats are remaining vacant even after re-notification, the unfilled seats shall be filled up from candidates belonging to OEC and in their absence, candidates belonging to Socially and Educationally Backward Communities (SEBC). The seats that remain unfilled will go to the open quota.

Claim of OEC candidates against the un-availed seats of SC/ST candidates: Other Eligible Community (OEC) candidates who claim allotment to the un-availed seats, if any, under SC/ST quota should furnish community and income certificates obtained from the Village Officer concerned. Those OEC candidates whose annual family income is up to Rs.8 lakhs (Rupees eight lakhs only) alone are eligible for such seats. Candidates belonging to other eligible communities are exempted from payment of fee at the time of allotment to UG Degree Programmes under Government/Community quota irrespective of annual family income as per G.O (Ms) No.36/07/SCSTDD dated 03.07.2007. They should provide Community Certificate from the Village Officer concerned.

5. PREPARATION OF RANK LISTS

The Rank List shall be prepared on the basis of index marks (out of 1000) prepared as follows:

Handicap/ Deduction of **5 marks** for every successive attempt after the first attempt subject to a maximum of **20 marks** will be deducted from the total marks in the case of those who have taken two or more chances to complete the examination. The number of chances means the number of appearances taken for passing any part of the qualifying examination after the prescribed programme period. **Appearance for improvement after cancellation of examination results shall not be considered as an additional chance.**

No handicap marks for SAY pass outs be imposed if admitted in the same academic year but **5marks** shall be deducted if he/she is ranked in the admission list of the succeeding year. Candidates who have passed the qualifying examination under SAY scheme or such supplementary scheme are eligible to apply for First Year programme in the same academic year, but they have to produce the mark lists on or before the closing date of admission as notified by the College.

Second languages will be allotted at the time of admission by the college/institution concerned based on the preference of the candidate and availability at the college without incurring any additional financial commitment on the part of the Govt/University and without any change in the existing staff pattern of the departments concerned.

Bonus Marks

The Bonus Marks will be awarded as follows:

1. Bonus of 15 marks shall be awarded to applicants with NCC weightage certificate, NSS Certificate, or Scout and Guide Certificate at **'Plus Two level'** for admission to all programmes. For NCC candidates, the bonus marks will be awarded on the basis of NCC Certificates signed by the Director and issued by the Directorate of NCC to candidates who have secured at least 75% attendance after having participated in its activities during the programme of study **immediately preceding the programme for which admission is sought**. *An additional bonus of 5 marks shall be given to 'B' Certificate holders.*
2. For NSS and Scout and Guide candidates, the bonus marks will be awarded on the basis of NSS, and Scout and Guide Certificates issued by the competent authorities.
3. The benefit of bonus marks can be scored by a candidate only under one category i.e., either NSS/Scout and Guide or NCC. Bonus marks shall be added only if the candidate has obtained the prescribed minimum qualifying marks in the qualifying examination while calculating the index marks.
4. Bonus of 15 marks shall be awarded to Ex-servicemen applicants and widows and children of Jawans and Ex-servicemen seeking admission to the Degree Programmes. Applicants to this category should invariably produce along with the application form an attested copy of certificate issued not earlier than six months from the last date of submission of application from the military authorities or state/Zilla Sainik Welfare Officer to the effect that he/she is the son/daughter of an ex-serviceman or an ex service man himself/herself.

Resolving of Tie

If the index marks of more candidates happen to be the same, then for breaking the 'tie', the following criteria shall be followed one after another in the order given below:

1. The candidate who has scored higher marks in the concerned elective subject shall be placed senior in the rank list. For B.Com. Programme, business studies (commerce) shall be considered as the elective subject.
2. If the tie holds on, candidate who has scored higher marks for part III subjects (or the subjects other than languages, if part is not specified) taken together shall be placed senior in the rank list.
3. If the tie still holds, the candidate who has scored higher marks in part I (English if part is not specified) shall be placed senior in the rank list.
4. If the tie still holds, the candidate who has scored higher marks in part III (second language if part is not specified) shall be placed senior in the rank list.
5. If the tie still holds, the tie will be resolved by giving residential weightage (at district/state levels)
6. If the tie still holds, preference shall be given to candidates who are elder, and the age difference shall be calculated in completed years only, rounding down fractions.

6. Migration Certificate, if applicable.
7. Caste Certificates proving eligibility for reservations and one self-attested copy of the same
8. Community Certificate along with income certificate (as per the Government rules) from the revenue authorities concerned to the effect that annual family income of all members of family from all sources taken together is less than Rs. 8 lakhs in the case of SEBC candidates who claim reservation under SEBC category. The income certificate should not have been issued earlier than 6 months prior to the submission of application. (Original and one self-attested copy each)
9. Candidates seeking reservation under Christian community should produce certificate from the village officer concerned and one self-attested copy of the same.

10. Candidates who wish to avail of bonus/weightage marks and those who come under sports/cultural/PD quotas must produce relevant certificates in original and one self-attested copy each for the same.
11. Four passport size photos of the applicant (taken within six months)
12. Any other documents found necessary by the Principal.

RAGGING IS A CRIME

Ragging is prohibited in this Institution

What is Ragging?

Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.

Administrative action in the event of ragging:

The institution shall punish a student found guilty of ragging after following the procedure and in the manner prescribed here in under:

The Anti-Ragging Committee of the institution shall take an appropriate decision, in regard to punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and nature and gravity of the incident of ragging established in the recommendations of the Anti-Ragging Squad

The Anti-Ragging Committee may, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, award, to those found guilty, one or more of the following punishments, namely;

- a) Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.
- b) Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits
- c) Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process.
- d) Withholding results.
- e) Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- f) Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
- g) Cancellation of admission.
- h) Rustication from the institution for period ranging from one to four semesters.
- i) Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period.

Provided that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.
