CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Departments develop action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. Delivery plans are charted by the departments for the effective transaction of curriculum content within the stipulated time. Teachers prepare

teaching plans based on the delivery plan followed by lesson plans. Teachers impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as group seminars, video lectures, webinars, case study, mini project, assignments, discussions, workshops and industrial visits. The traditional lecture method is also used in the process. Assessment is made through Continuous Internal Evaluation. Outcome of the curriculum transaction is assessed by the departments at the end of each semester. Curriculum and academic calendar are prescribed by the University. Each student is given a copy of the course plan. Students are also provided with the academic calendar. Allocation of the subjects to the faculty is done taking into consideration, the faculty qualifications, subjects specialization and experience. Class attendance registers are scrutinized by the HOD. Invited lectures by industry and domain experts are arranged. Industrial and field visits are organized. Periodical feedback is obtained from the students on teaching. Regular Class Committee meetings are held by the Head of the Department to review the teaching-learning process, academic progress of the students and to address grievances. Faculty members are members of the Board of Studies of various Universities and Autonomous Institutions. 2 teachers (Malayalam and Botany) serve as chairpersons of the PG Board of Studies and 7 serve as members. There are 6 members from the college in the UG Board of Studies. One faculty is a member of PG Board of Studies of Sanskrit University, Kalady. Faculty members are involved in course restructuring and revision committees constituted by the Mahatma Gandhi University. This enables the faculty to contribute towards the curriculum development, even within the affiliation system. 71 faculty members were active members of the question paper setting and evaluation teams of different universities and autonomous colleges, setting questions papers and evaluating examination scripts.

The College has a structured mentoring system, established to fulfill the academic and psychosocial needs of the students, by linking their subjects of study to real life situations, facilitating life skills/soft skills, fostering moral sensitivity and civic responsibility in order to create well adjusted, global citizens. Department level mentoring groups with a 1:18 Teacher student ratio meets on a weekly basis. These interactive sessions enable mentors to identify areas of concern and adopt remedial measures in order to ensure holistic development. Apart from academic mentoring, including remedial classes, mentors encourage student participation in the clubs and societies constituted for their benefit based on individual taste and talent. In keeping with college's vision of better health for all, the NCC and the Department of Physical Education provide an avenue for mentees who require an active lifestyle, enabling learners to cope with stress and other personal issues. Mentors also refer students to BLISS a counseling cell run by the Department of Psychology. Social commitment and empathy are cultivated through participation in the NSS and Pain and Palliative Care unit. As per suggestions of members and based on individual needs and interests, mentors encourage students to enroll for NPTEL courses to enhance knowledge and employability.

In UG Board of studies, there were 6 members. Five faculty are members of Faculty Board for Social Sciences and Languages. course restructuring and revision committees constituted by the Mahatma Gandhi University, thereby enabling the faculty to contribute towards the curriculum development, even within the affiliation system. 3. 85 percent of the faculty are active members of different universities and autonomous colleges to frame questions papers and evaluate examination scripts. 4. <p>Every year, the College consumes approximately 248,580 units of electricity (average monthly consumption of 20,715) at a cost of approximately 24 lakhs/ p.a. The College, a not for profit educational institution running with the support of benevolent donors, finds it very difficult to raise that much amount for recurring expenses. Being the only means to reduce the dependence on conventional energy, the two way strategy was adopted by the college aiming at the rational use of power by educating the staff and students, and harness on the alternate sources of energy. Hence the college has proposed generation of ecologically sustainable and clean source of renewable energy within the capacity of the college. Now the college has initiated works to generate solar energy by installing rooftop solar PV plant using the land/ buildings under the control of the college. The college will generate 60KW of power. The project implemented with the financial support of South Indian Bank (under its CSR allocation) will transmit generated power to the grid of Kerala State Electricity Board. 1. Title: Promotion of students' research and publications Goals: a. To familiarize undergraduate and postgraduate students with the scholarly activities b. To encourage them to pursue their academic projects with seriousness c. To familiarize them with the standards of publications, academic writing etc. d. To make them aware of publication channels e. To help students to network with peers and other scholars of the respective fields Context While reflecting on the academic experiences during the previous assessment period, the faculty of the college came to know that if promoted, students will excel in research and subsequent presentations publications. Hence, it was decided to inculcate research aptitude among students both undergraduate and postgraduate to pursue small scale research, and present their findings in conferences for wider discussion. The Practice: As an initiative, four departments (Economics, Malayalam, Physics, and Psychology) actively promoted this practice among both undergraduate and postgraduate students. Several students responded to this initiative call of the departments and pursued their academic projects with specific scope. When conferences/ seminars were announced, teachers and college librarian provided necessary guidelines in preparing presentations and articles as per the formats prescribed by organizers. Evidence of success The scholarly activities of students belong to various disciplines are mentioned below: a.

Economics - 5 paper presentations in conferences b. English - 1 article published in scholarly journal c. Malayalam - 8 (Interviews of leaders of social service activities and community welfare groups will be published as a book in the coming year. Students who attended interviews were rigorously trained through a series of mock interviews) d. Psychology - 18 students presented papers. e. Physics - 9 students participated in conferences and presented 2 papers another 3 students got research funding from a state government agency. f. Zoology - 1 student got award for her PG Project g. Botany - 1 student presented paper in Kerala Botanical Society. The practice will be further popularized and strengthened in the next year by conducting a workshop on research methodologies, and inviting participation from more departments. Problems encountered a. Lack of sufficient time to conduct research and then to prepare articles due to the tight class schedule. 2.

The department of Malayalam has been very active in promoting discussions, research, etc. in topics related to the marginalized issues of Cultural studies, Malayalam Language,and Literature. Ever since the inception of the undergraduate program they have conducted seminars, conferences, workshops etc for the benefit of students. In the past, many such programs were appreciated by the college community, and had impact on students' learning.

However, such programs were not properly documented or archived. Hence, the department embarked on organizing programs systematically, and subsequently archive/publish the documents presented in such programs. The Practice: Since 2007, every year the department selects a key theme for discussions and subsequent seminars in that year, and at the end of the year publishes the documents presented in the series of seminars in the form of a journal called 'Bhoomi Malayalam'. The outcome is that a key theme which requiring academic attention will be examined in detail by scholars from various perspectives, and papers will be brought out for wider circulation and readership. Besides, the practice promotes academic writing among the students of the college. Evidence

of success: The department has been publishing the journal since 20 and contents of many of them are followed by students as a supplement to the prescribed textbooks of Mahatma Gandhi University for undergraduate and postgraduate courses. Problems encountered No significant problems encountered
